

Captain Hancock captures a Chuckwalla

Scientific discovery in the realms of Zoology has been enriched by the yearly expeditions of Captain Allan Hancock in Pacific waters. It has long been the desire of our foremost scientists to visit remote corners of the world to study the flora and fauna found on those shores. The Cruiser Velero III was built for that purpose. Each year scientists from the leading institutions of the United States and Canada are taken farther afield in search of data. Specimens found on hitherto unexplored shores are brought back for study and exhibition purposes. Rare and unknown specimens discovered from the many expeditions are to be found in the Smithsonian Institute, Field Museum of Natural History, Steinhart Aquarium, San Francisco, The San Diego Zoological Society and the Universities of Michigan, Nebraska, Southern California and British Columbia.

W. Chas. Swett, who has accompanied Captain Hancock on these cruises, has made thrilling records in still and motion pictures of the various activities of the scientists and the discoveries of the Allan Hancock Expeditions.

Motion Pictures

Birth and Education of a Seal • A rare study of the actual birth of a seal with the immediate swimming lesson to the new born babe by the mother. The dangers that lurk in nearby waters add adventure to the picture as the mother and baby, pursued by a killer whale, race for life to the nearby shore.

Elephant Seals • Found only off the coast of lower California on Guadalupe Island are an interesting study in an animal life almost extinct. The capture of an elephant seal for the San Diego Zoological Society is shown in the motion picture which also depicts the habits of the seal, including bulls in deadly combat.

Tropical Birds • Years of carefully planned expeditions to tropical islands have resulted in rare pictures of amazing species of bird life such as the Socorro Sooty Tern; the Blue-footed, Olive-footed and Brewster's Boobies; the Red-billed Tropic Bird, the Galapagos Albatross, famed in the annals of ornithology for its courting dance; Flightless Cormorants of Albemarle island; Man O' War birds; forked-tailed Gulls and Flamingoes.





(16 mm., 300 feet, silent with sub-titles.)


